

**Monthly report to Landsort Board by Observatory Wardens:  
Chris Sharpe & Kay Collister  
September 2017**

**Summary**

During the first part of the month strong to very strong, mainly NE winds were followed by a period of strong to very strong winds from the south/ south-west. This period included a day of gales with very strong winds that meant most of the afternoon was spent bailing water out of the cellar and lab. From the 15<sup>th</sup> to 21<sup>st</sup> the main wind direction was NE of moderate strength, which improved the number of birds caught per day but it was not until the last week of the month that the predominantly NE winds resulted in significant numbers of birds being caught, with 1740 in nine days, 1180 of these being in the last three days. On the 30<sup>th</sup> a total of 648 birds caught at Bredmar (475) and SUDD (173) was the 3<sup>rd</sup> highest autumn day catch in the history of the Observatory.

**Ringling**

All data entered onto Fågel3 and submitted to Ringling Central.

2869 new birds of 51 species were caught in the month, the third highest September in the 30 years of the Observatory, with only the years 1990 and 2008 being better. Nets were opened at SUDD on five dates, producing 277 new birds of 20 species. The year total now stands at 7,093, significantly more (63%) than the 1988-2017 average as at the end of September which stands at 4,336.

Captures of note included:

- A Tornfalk (Kestrel) on the 6<sup>th</sup>, only the 8<sup>th</sup> caught on the Observatory;
- The first autumn Mindre flugsnappare (Red-breasted Flycatcher) also on the 6<sup>th</sup>, the first of five for the month, finishing with one at SUDD on the 30<sup>th</sup>;
- Videsparv (Rustic Bunting) on the 15<sup>th</sup>, the 14<sup>th</sup> caught here;
- Höksångare (Barred Warbler) on the 22<sup>nd</sup>, with a Blåhake (Bluethroat) on that day;
- The only Gräshoppsångare (Grasshopper Warbler) of the year on the 23<sup>rd</sup>;
- Single Sävsångare (Sedge Warbler) on the 23<sup>rd</sup>, 27<sup>th</sup> and 29<sup>th</sup>;
- Taigasångare (Yellow-browed Warbler) on the 29<sup>th</sup>;
- 28 Järnsparv (Dunnock) on the 30<sup>th</sup>, the highest autumn day-catch for the species.

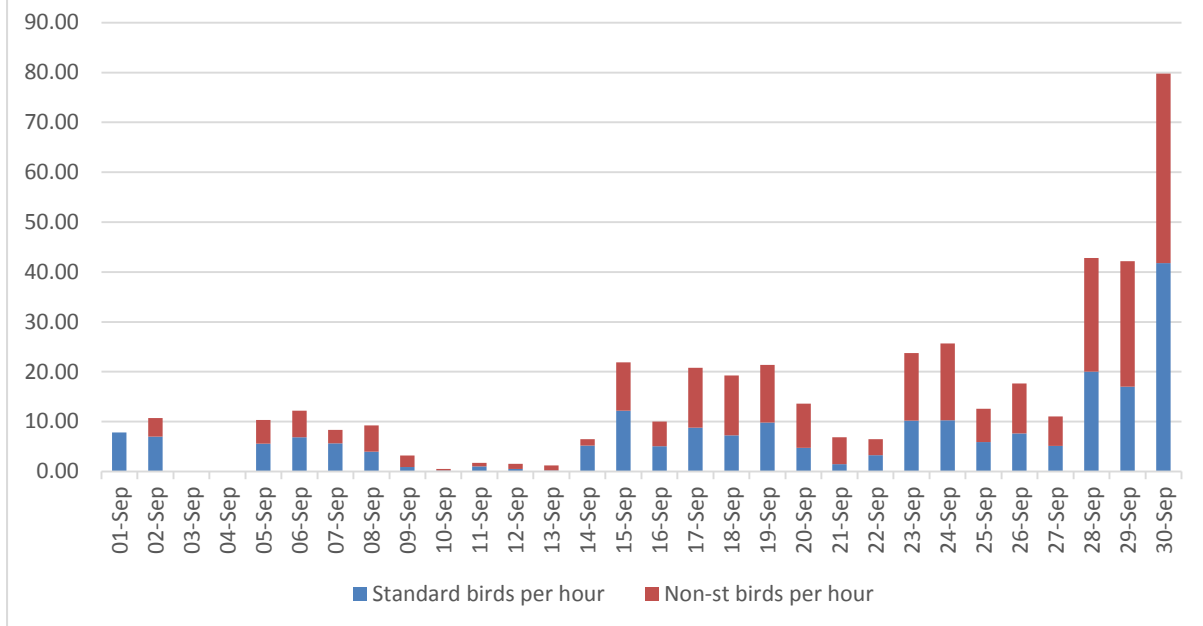

### Sightings of note during September

Among a range of interesting sightings for the month, mostly covered on the daily diary, or on Artportalen, the following were of note:

- Spillkråka (Black Woodpecker) on the 8th;
- Two Bivråk (Honey-buzzard) 13th;
- Smalnäbbad simsnäppa (Red-necked Phalarope) on the 16th;
- Two Fiskgjuse on the 17<sup>th</sup>, with 1335 Storskarv (Cormorant) and a single Ljungpipare (Golden Plover) also that day;
- Single Fjällvråk (Rough-legged Buzzard) on the 18<sup>th</sup> and 19<sup>th</sup>;
- A Blå kärrhök (Hen Harrier) on the 21<sup>st</sup>;
- A total of 1090 Vitkindad gås (Barnacle Geese) on the 22<sup>nd</sup>, with 950 Bofink (Chaffinch) on the same day;
- Single Brun kärrhök (Marsh Harrier) on the 23<sup>rd</sup>;
- The first Taigasångare (Yellow-browed Warbler) on the 23<sup>rd</sup>, with another on the 24<sup>th</sup>;
- A Stäpphök (Pallid Harrier) on the 27<sup>th</sup>;
- A decent migration past the island on the 28<sup>th</sup> included: 60 Prutgås (Brent Goose), 694 Bläsand (Wigeon), 57 Stjärtand (Pintail) with single Sidensvans (Waxwing) and Lappsparv (Lapland Bunting) also present on the island;
- On the final day of the month two Gulärta (Yellow Wagtail), a single Rödstrupig piplärka (Red-throated Pipit), a Pilgrimsfalk (Peregrine Falcon); eight Nötskrika (Jay) and 1100 Bofink (Chaffinch) were among a range of migratory birds observed.

### Other work on the Observatory

- Routine strimming of net rides and paths;
- All bird bags washed;
- Daily diary blog kept up to date;

- 10 guided talks given (see later);
- Weekly cash reconciliations undertaken and record kept of over-night stays (see later);
- On-going work on work-plan and method statements covering the work of Wardens;
- Common areas, toilet, kitchen etc cleaned before and after each weekend;
- Lab cleaned weekly;
- Cellar cleared of flood water;
